



How do I view Onshore Outcomes?

This task card demonstrates how to view the Onshore Outcomes after a search for a case has been conducted in BICON. Onshore Outcomes include specific inspections, treatments, processing and/or testing. Onshore Outcomes include all activities up until the release, export or destruction of the goods.

1. View Onshore Outcomes

After you have conducted a search in BICON (via **Quick Search**, **Scientific Name Search** or **Tariff Code Search**), defined the import scenario by answering their questions, and navigated through the import conditions, you can view the onshore outcomes. Select [View Onshore Outcomes](#).

Import Conditions

Import conditions define the biosecurity requirements which must be met for your import. Where import conditions have been developed, they will be listed below.

- Prior to the importation of **goods** into Australian territory, a valid import permit issued by the Department of Agriculture is required.

An import permit may be obtained by submitting an [import permit application](#) to the department (if viewed online, use the 'Apply Now' button at the bottom of this page).
- Under the [Biosecurity Charges Imposition \(General\) Regulation 2016](#) and Chapter 9, Part 2 of the [Biosecurity Regulation 2016](#), fees are payable to the Department of Agriculture for all services. Detail on how the department applies fees and levies may be found in the [charging guidelines](#).
- In addition to the conditions for the goods being imported, non-commodity concerns must be assessed including container cleanliness, packaging and destination concerns, and may be subject to inspection and treatment on arrival. Please refer to the [Non-Commodity Cargo Clearance](#) BICON case for further information.

Onshore Outcomes

- Present all documentation

The importer or nominated agent must present all required documentation to the Department of Agriculture as part of the import procedure.

- Treatment

The goods require treatment with gamma irradiation at 10 kGray (1.0 Mrad).
